

Purpose

- To address and prevent problems faced by youth and their families by providing accessible online portals that provide resources, training, workshops, and links to community resources and experts in various fields to assist youth and their guardians/ parents with issues they face.
- To carry out activities ancillary and incidental to the above charitable purposes.

We bring together expertise in education, mental health and business to give our approach balance and ensure that the whole community has representation.

Healthy Youth Network uses Search Institute's Developmental Assets Framework to guide our work, focus our efforts and evaluate outcomes. We follow Search Institute's Developmental Relationship Framework to guide our interactions with youth and effectively engage them. By embedding assets & relationships in young people's lives, we improve mental health, reduce at-risk behaviour, and create better outcomes.



An Ally Program to tackle gender-based violence amongst youth grew into HEART (Healthy Education About Relationships Team). Mackenzie, our Program Coordinator, took HEART and nurtured it, allowing students to prune and shape it into something that resonated with them. As with any healthy plant, it allowed us to divide and transplant it into another area where it could continue spreading.

What's Your Path had taken root in 2013 as a perennial. This annual event has been modified over the years to meet the needs of students. However, in 2023 a new variation emerged after Covid had changed the conditions in which it could grow. Sherri and our dedicated team rose to the challenge, while Sophie from MediaBay Creative and Market Mechanics took the vision and turned it into a crowd-stopper. The Youth Portal and Parent Place are still small saplings just waiting for the right tools to allow our gardeners to turn them into something that will spread.

There are those plants that are prolific, they start in one area of your garden and then begin popping up in other areas. Others are invasive and begin to choke out everything around them. Our job is to determine where to prune and which will bear the best fruit (or flowers), giving them the nutrients they need to be healthy. It's knowing the conditions that exist and those that you can create. It's having a team who are specialists in different areas. Develop a communication strategy and continue to build the online portals to improve awareness of local resources and to increase service coordination.


Attract at least 5 new community partners to participate in the annual Flamborough Paint Challenge Event and increase school involvement.

What's next

Secure additional funding for a full-time dedicated staff person and additional resources to;

- Expand the Speakers Bureau, ensuring;
 - » diversity so all students can see themselves reflected
 - » meeting the career interests of students
- Scale up the portal into other Hamilton and Halton schools
- Develop a communication strategy to promote the portal to;
 - » business professionals submit a career profile
 - » teachers to book a speaker to come into their classroom
- Plan career fairs and events in partnership with the schools
- Explore partnerships to enhance the portal
- Create new opportunities such as targeting specific careers or demographics (ie. Fem-in-Stem, the arts, Trades, BIPOC, Indigenous, LGBTQIA+)
- Develop a new "Program Profiles" section that features the profiles of post-secondary students who will share valuable insights about their program








HEART Program

Our Core Values:

- **1. Trust:** Building trust within school communities where students can have open and honest conversations in a safe space.
- **2. Empowerment:** Supporting and lifting each other up, building youth confidence to speak their voice and build healthy relationships.
- **3. Education:** Providing relevant and up-to-date resources and communication regarding relationships and gender-based violence.
- **4. Empathy:** Being understanding, sensitive, compassionate and genuinely caring towards all others, regardless of our differences.

At the beginning of the 2022/23 school year, a diverse group of 10 students were recruited at both Waterdown District High School and Sir Allan MacNab Secondary School. From evidence-based interventions, students received training on understanding and building healthy relationships. Using this information, they developed a work plan and communication strategy targeted at specific groups of students and the general population.

Youth Portal & Parent Place

In 2020, shortly after the pandemic hit, a father called Healthy Youth Network in a panic. His son's best friend had committed suicide and he was fearful there would be more. He didn't know where to turn for help or find information & resources that would help him support his son.
